January and February are quiet months for the Friends, as we take stock of the past year and start planning for the new. First on our list is to find brave and hardy souls for our **2019 Library Cart Drill Team** to take part in the Mystic Irish Parade on **Sunday, March 24**. Later that week, on **March 29 and 30,** the Friends will hold our **Ninth Annual Indoor Yard Sale** during regular Library hours. (You may already begin donating your children's old toys and the cookware you no longer use.) Since our sale is indoors, it's often the first of the season, an advantage to everyone.

While we're practicing for the Irish Parade, we're also trying to think of the title or character of a book that can be represented by good-tasting food, since our next project is the **Edible Book Fest**, which is hosted by Groton Public Library on **Sunday, April 7.** This international celebration of books and reading involves all three Groton Libraries, i.e. Bill Memorial, Mystic & Noank Library, and Groton Public Library. Past entries include "Olive 'r Twist," "The Cane Mutiny" and "A Wrinkle in Lime." (Mito, our library cat, would choose "If You Give a Mouse a Cookie.") The Groton Public Library opens its doors on Sundays at 1pm, and those with entries in the Fest may start setting them up right away. By 1:15, the general public is invited to browse among the entries and guess the titles. When everyone has had a good look around the room, the MC will reveal the book title, character, or theme of each entry. **Then comes the best part - we eat the food**! Just coming to observe and eat? Try to arrive no later than 1:30. While guessing the book titles, be sure to buy raffle tickets, in hopes of winning a raffle basket donated by a participating library. While it's fun to attend the Edible Book Festival, it's even better to **create your own Edible Book**! Details and entry forms will be available in early March at all three Groton libraries. Fill out a form, assemble your creation, and bring it to the Groton Public Library on Sunday, April 7.

April is also the month when the Friends start planning our Annual Fair, which is our biggest fund-raiser and friend-raiser of the year. The first part of the Fair is the **Silent Auction**, which runs from the first Monday of May to 2 pm on **Fair Day, Saturday, June 1**. The generosity of local merchants, along with donations from friends and Friends, will provide about 100 special items to auction, as well as a great number of gift certificates.

The Friends of Mystic & Noank Library have ten monthly meetings a year, most on the third Monday of the month. If you've donated time to the Library, or given to the Annual Fund, you are already a Friend, and we invite you to attend a meeting to see if you'd like to contribute to our work.
